Key Facts

- Toys are things we play with.
- Toys have changed over time. Your parents and grand parents will have played with different toys to that you play with today. They will continue to develop over time.
- Toys are made out of different materials. Modern toys are often made from plastic. In the past, many toys were made out of wood.
- Looking at what a toy is made out of can help us work out how old it is.
- Old toys were mechanical and often moved by hand.
- Modern toys often use batteries.

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- Rich Victorian children often played with toys such as rocking horses, toy soldiers or dolls.
- Poor Victorian children often played with wooden boats or peg dolls.
- Teddy bears have been around for more than 100 years and used to be stuffed with wood shavings. Now they are stuffed with soft fibres.
- Teddy bears are named after the US President Theodore Roosevelt. He saved a bear cub from hunters and newspapers printed the story. Soon toy makers made 'teddy bears'. Children loved them and still do.
