Key Questions and Golden Nuggets

What's wrong with the world?	Christians and Jews believe that people prefer to do their own thing rather than follow God. They call this sin and believe people need to keep saying sorry and ask for help. Christians believe the Holy Spirit gives this help. Muslims believe that people do good and bad deeds and need God's mercy too. All three religions believe that these wrong choices harm the world.
Repairing the world, rescuing the Earth: what can we learn from this Jewish idea?	Throughout scripture, Jews are taught about being good stewards for the world they believe God created. Jews believe in the idea of Tikkun Olam which is about a responsibility to mend and repair the world.
Who is inspired by Jesus' example of sacrifice?	Christians believe that Jesus died and gave his life as a sacrifice. This has motivated many people through history and today to live their lives in a way that puts others first.
How do Muslims try to make the world a better place?	All Muslims have a duty to give a slice of their money to charity. It is to please Allah and what He guides a Muslim to do as shown in the Qur'an. Each year, every Muslim works out what he or she needs to live and then Zakah is paid from what is left. The aim of paying Zakah is to stop people becoming too greedy or selfish with money.
How do non-religious people try to make the world a better place?	Many non-religious people hold beliefs about how to treat the world and many non-religious people choose to follow versions of the 'Golden Rule'. Some non-religious people follow the worldview called Humanism.

The Jewish teaching of tikkun olam is about mending or repairing the world. It is an idea anyone can learn from. You don't have to be Jewish like me to do your bit for the world and its people.

How Jewish people show care

- Many Jewish people put money into a collection box called a tzedakah. It can be found at home or at the synagogue, a Jewish place of worship.
- . When the tzedakah box is full, it is donated to charity or a special cause.
- · People come together to pray at the synagogue, but it can also be used
- Tikkun Olam means 'repair the world'. Jewish people try to do this to help people and the world.
- Tikkun Olam can be done in different ways, for example by planting trees, recycling, or visiting people who are unwell or need help.

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Many Humanists think:

'The world is a wonderful and amazing planet, but it is not perfect - things go wrong, and people can be hurt. We can work together to make it better. We won't get any help from gods or goddesses, but we can make the world better

Many Christians think: 'God made the world good and beautiful. Humans are free to choose how to live. This freedom is a gift from God. The Bible says we have spoiled our relationship with God and spoiled the world by making bad choices (called 'sin'). But God came to Earth (in Jesus) to rescue us and repair the damage. Now we need to make the world better too." Hannah Many Muslims think:

Every human is born submitted to Allah (God). But people turn away from God and do bad things. This can spoil our lives — and other people's lives too. But Allah has shown us the straight path to live by. It is called Islam. We try to follow the path and help make a better world.'



Many Jewish people think:

'The Almighty (G-d) created the Earth and 🥞 everything in it, and he makes all things good. But the world needs to be mended all the time.

Jewish people have an idea called 'Tikkun Olam.' It means to 'mend the world' and people work with God to make the world better. Anyone can join in.

The third pillar of Islam is called Zakah. This is where Muslims who can afford to must give money to help poor people. All Muslims have a duty to give a slice of their money to charity. It is to please Allah and what He quides a Muslim to do as shown in the Qur'an. Each year, every Muslim works out what he or she needs to live and then Zakah is paid from what is left. The aim of paying Zakah is to stop people becoming too greedy or sel fish with money. It tries to clean a person's mind and heart of the love for money and keeping it to oneself. It is given to poor people, orphans, people who owe money to someone else and to travellers. The Qur'an talks a lot about generosity, for example:

"Whatever you spend with a good heart, give it to parents, relatives, orphans, the helpless, and travellers in need. Whatever good you do, God is aware of it." - Quran 2:215
